Statute for Indigenous Land Acknowledgement Statement

- 2 Whereas, Indigenous land acknowledgement is an effort to recognize the Indigenous past,
- 3 present, and future of a particular location and to understand one's own place in that relationship;
- 4 Whereas, Evaluation of the previous land recognition statement revealed areas that could be
- 5 strengthened including inclusion of accurate historical context, connection of past, present, and
- 6 future, as well as dedication to continued support of Indigenous people;
- 7 Whereas, The University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point (UWSP) Native American Center (NAC)
- 8 and Student Government Association (SGA) collaborated to create a new statement to be read
- 9 aloud at the starts of all UWSP SGA officially sponsored events;
- 10 Whereas, This statement is as follows:

With profound reflection, we acknowledge that the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point exists upon land inhabited by the indigenous people of this area, including but not limited to, the Menominee, Ho-Chunk, Ojibwe, Potawatomi, and the many other nations and groups that predate colonial borders.

While this state institution has a rich history of its own, for countless generations, these lands were home to this diverse group of Native American people. Beginning with colonization and continuing for centuries, Native American people were forcibly removed from their home to unfamiliar and inhospitable lands. This brought sickness, trauma, and loss in many forms, including the mass grave site of indigenous people that our campus sits upon. In reverence to the truth, we acknowledge this occurred.

We recognize the responsibility of the university to support Native people, communities—and world views—so all might benefit from their teachings and hard-fought lessons. We also recognize that the generations of Native American communities, their cultures, and their knowledge systems shaped the land in a sustainable way that allows us to continue to enjoy its gifts today. For this, we are truly grateful.

Together we hope to find ways to move forward while acknowledging and respecting this history. Although words cannot convey the weight of the injustices wrought upon all indigenous peoples of Turtle Island, the proof of their resilience is brought into the light by the knowledge that they have been, are, and always will be a part of this institution and the land we live on. In partnership with the Native American Center, we explore durable ways of recognizing, supporting, and advocating for the sovereignty of all tribal nations and their citizens. We commit to work together to honor the past, be intentional in the present, and to build our future with truth.

- 42 Therefore, be it Further Resolved, UWSP SGA highly recommends the above statement be
- 43 read before Common Council meetings, large campus programs, and be considered for
- 44 implementation at other gatherings;
- 45 Therefore, be it Further Resolved, UWSP SGA supports the Native American Center, the
- 46 proposed statement, and all indigenous students;
- 47 Therefore, be it Further Resolved, UWSP SGA will continue to explore avenues for the
- 48 amplification of Indigenous voices, education of the shared history, and establishment of
- 49 permanent resources for Indigenous students;
- Therefore, be it Finally Resolved, Upon approval, this statute will be sent to Chancellor
